Cold Weather Safety Reminders!



- 1. Precise Pre-flight Checks: Before you venture into the chilly air, spend extra time and attention on your pre-flight inspection. The pre-flight should take longer, not shorter especially with winter weather on the horizon.
- Check for Ice and Snow: Inspect your aircraft meticulously for ice, frost, or snow accumulation on the wings, tail, and control surfaces. Ensure they are clear before takeoff.

- Aircraft Lights: Verify that all aircraft lights, including navigation lights and landing lights, are in proper working order for enhanced visibility during low-light winter conditions.
- 2. Dress for the Cold: When you're out on the tarmac in cold temperatures, proper attire is essential to stay comfortable and safe.
 - Dress in warm, layered clothing to stay comfortable during pre-flight preparations and in-flight.
 - Wear insulated gloves, a thermal hat, and waterproof, insulated boots to protect against the cold.
- 3. Weather Awareness: Staying informed about weather conditions is a critical aspect of winter flying safety.
 - Regular Updates: Keep a close eye on local weather forecasts and conditions. Monitor temperature, visibility, wind speed, and direction.
 - Flight Planning: Plan your flights with extra caution in mind. Anticipate potential weather delays or unexpected changes, and have alternate routes and airports in your back pocket.

Operations Report – Novembr 2023 by Col Mike Woods – WI Wing Operations Officer

- October was a rather quiet flying month for our Wing. Only four flights in the T-34 and a repositioning flight to
 Oshkosh for the SNJ. There was a slight detour to Burlington for the Oshkosh flight since Gary wanted to make an
 appearance at the Burlington Air Show. We lost our hangar space at Waukesha for the SNJ but for now we have a free
 hangar at OSH. As soon as HQ can get the PT flying we will move the SNJ there. Mike Woods flew the T-34 to
 Burlington too and was able to park it reasonably close to our PX tent.
- As Scott mentioned in his maintenance report there has been some maintenance issues with the T-34, but most have been addressed, but we are waiting to do a retightening of the wing straps that were mandated by the FAA for all T-34s. GAMI put those on 3 years ago and they need to have this done every 3 years. GAMI said it takes only a few hours the first time thru and less after that.

Col. Charles "Skipper" Merkel, 128th Vice Commander (128th Wing Commander effective Jan. '24)

On Thursday, October 26th the Wisconsin Wing had the opportunity to meet at the 128th Air Refueling Wing for a briefing and tour of a KC-135R Stratotanker. Our Wing was hosted by Col. Charles "Skipper" Merkel, the 128th Vice Commander, plus many 128th Air Force personnel. On October 31st, it was announced that Col. Merkel will assume the Wing Commander role in January 2024. If Col. Merkel looked familiar, it was because he was formerly the Vice Commander of the 115th Fighter Wing in Madison and he led our tour of that facility in 2022!

We had the opportunity to tour a KC-135R that was in a hanger for maintenance. That saved us from walking out on the tarmac in pouring rain. The last KC-135 was built in 1965. The aircraft we toured was made in 1961. That makes it 62 years old! Boeing made 732 KC-135's for the US Air Force. There are currently 415 left in service. These KC-135's were upgraded to new engines back in the 1980's and received CFM56-2 high bypass turbofan engines. These are quieter, save 25% on fuel, and have 22,000 LBS of thrust! These KC-135's are overpowered compared to the old water injection engines originally installed (ask Col Vic Stottlemeyer about these). The CFM56-2 is the same engine used on the Boeing 737 passenger aircraft.

A few other interesting observations from our visit:

- 1. There are 10 fuel tanks on the KC-135R. Six in the wings and four in the fuselage. They hold up to 33,000 gallons of fuel. The crew can transfer fuel from any of these tanks to facilitate weight and balance and to refuel other aircraft.
- 2. Inside the main front hatch is a small holder that has the aircraft "gas credit card". This is used to refuel at non-military airports. It must have a very high credit limit!
- 3. The KC-135R is a "fly by cable and pulley" aircraft. This means manual control of all flight controls. The pilots told us they are exhausted after a day of touch and go landings.
- 4. The new CFM56-2 engines have a larger diameter than the older engines. This results in the inboard engines being only 18" off the ground! This makes for precise landings to avoid engine scrapes. The pilot must be very careful on the final approach, especially in strong winds.
- 5. There are no ejection seats in the KC-135R and they don't carry parachutes either. The parachutes were removed in 2008 to save money.

This was a very rewarding afternoon, and everyone had a great time. We appreciate the hospitality of Col. Charles Merkel and the entire 128th Air Refueling Wing team. We went to dinner at the Machine Shed afterwards. Special thanks to Col. Dave Cook for setting up this exceptional tour.

WWII Warbird Visits La Junta/Rocky Ford

An historic 1941 North American AT-6 advanced trainer from WWII days recently visited the area on its way home to Sweetwater, TX. This 2-seat 600 hp radial engine powerhouse was designed to be the trainer for the infamous single seat P-51 fighter that changed the course of WWII. Thousands of pilots trained in AT-6's, also called "the pilot maker" and the "Texan". The Navy also flew a modified version of this versatile aircraft and designated it the SNJ. The British Commonwealth built and flew them as Harvard's. Nearly all of the 10,000+ Texans were built in the huge North American factory in north Dallas. T-6's served all over the world in both training and active combat roles. More than 1000 are still flying today to keep our memories of the "greatest generation" alive.

The National WASP WWII Museum is located on Avenger Field in Sweetwater, Tx and honors the memory of the hundreds of women's auxiliary service pilots who trained in these AT-6 aircraft, going on to fly nearly every aircraft in service during WWII in non-combat roles. WASP's delivered aircraft from the factories to military bases, performed demonstration flights for newly released warplanes and sometimes unexpectedly found themselves in active combat situations when delivering warplanes to the front lines! More information on WASP's can be found at www.waspmuseum.org The story of how these unsung hero women pilots impacted our war efforts and successes is remarkable!

The visiting AT-6 is owned by the WASP museum and was making a very much delayed flight home from Oshkosh WI and the biggest air show in the world, EAA's annual AirVenture. The museum chief pilot Malcolm Laing asked Oshkosh resident and 50 year flying veteran Gary Otto to bring their warbird home following some needed repairs. Gary has hundreds of hours flying these powerful "time machines" and agreed to fly the 8+ hour journey provided that the museum would allow him to veer off the direct flight path to TX and visit his longtime friends, Kenny and Chris Casper, of Rocky Ford. The adventurous trip went off flawlessly on Oct. 9th with clear skies and even a little tailwind to boot! Gary's friendship with Chris goes back 54 years when she lived in Oshkosh WI. Kenny and Chris treated their guest to some fantastic down-home Colorado hospitality that even included a successful tarantula hunt!

When asked about his warbird flying Gary stated "I am a volunteer pilot for the Commemorative Air Force, whose mission is to keep these historic flying machines active to "Educate, Inspire and Honor. We use these planes to touch people's lives in so many ways. I have flown the Wisconsin based CAF SNJ over 60 times this year alone, carrying out this honorable mission."
